## **Reports from HTSB's Licensing Specialists**

## **Specialist Tracey Idica, NBCT:**

Specialist Idica's National Board work continues. She and Institute for Native Pacific Education and Culture (INPEACE) staff have planned the monthly meetings with the INPEACE Waianae Coast Initial Candidate Cohort and the Waianae Coast Maintenance of Certification (MOC) Cohort. Meeting space has been reserved at the INPEACE's new location. There will be an in-person information session and cohort orientation next month. In June, Specialist Idica and Specialist Molina facilitated the 3rd annual "On Board for National Board" workshop on the Leeward Coast in partnership with INPEACE. This summer Specialist Idica attended the virtual National Board Leadership/Champions Academy. Hawai'i was recognized as an exemplar in connecting stakeholders and engaging policy makers with National Board.

Specialist Idica met with Hawai'i Education Association's (HEA) executive director, public relations consultant and president to discuss the possibility of a statewide conference for Hawai'i NBCTs. They are currently planning a meeting in September or October to further discuss this opportunity for collaboration with the NB Collective and Executive Director Villalobos.

Specialist Idica and Licensing Clerk Pang continue to attend the monthly Charter School Commission meetings and work and monitor the monthly charter school reports. They have worked to update the reporting process to ensure compliance with licensing requirements. They are currently offering schools the opportunity for additional training on licensing and report requirements. They have met with two new Public Charter Schools regarding HTSB responsibilities and reporting requirements. The biggest change for School Year 25-26 is reports are now due each month for year-round reporting. This was changed to address a charter school suggestion for HTSB to be proactive and address licensing requirements for employment before the start of the school year.

### Specialist Kris Murakami, Esq.:

Licensing Specialist Kris Murakami accomplished the following tasks or participated in the following events:

Licensing Specialist Murakami developed two universal templates for the Licensing Specialists to utilize. One template is for Suspension of the Rules. The other template is to be used when an applicant has falsified their information on their application or supporting documents related to their application.

Licensing Specialist Murakami prepared approximately 170 professional fitness letters and also prepared approximately 150-160 detailed written messages to individuals. Licensing Specialist Murakami usually prepares multiple messages for one individual.

Licensing Specialist Murakami prepared approximately 50 Demand for Hearing letters.

Licensing Specialist Murakami participated in meetings with Teach Away/Klassroom for teacher candidates who were abruptly dropped from the Teach Away EPP without any transition so that they could complete their Educator Preparation Program. This included preparing correspondences to the Director of Teach Away.

Licensing Specialist Murakami prepared Finding of Fact; Conclusions of Law; Final Board Orders in four cases. Two cases were contested hearing cases.

Licensing Specialist Murakami prepared an extensive PowerPoint presentation with the assistance of Licensing Clerk Natalie Aquino regarding all matters related to professional fitness. Licensing Specialist Murakami presented it to the Board on the first day of HTSB's Strategic Plan Summer Summit held on June 9, 2025.

On the second day of the Strategic Plan Summer Summit held on June 10, 2025, Licensing Specialist Murakami together with Executive Director Felicia Villalobos were responsible for facilitating stakeholder discussions on Support, Strategies and Other (Comments/Questions) regarding Strengthening Ethical Practice and Accountability. Prior to the breakout group sessions, Felicia and Licensing Specialist Murakami did a brief presentation on the Model Code of Ethics for Educators.

Licensing Specialist Murakami collaborated with Licensing Specialist Steven Harada and Licensing Specialist Dr. Mitzie Higa and conducted a comprehensive license/permit presentation at the AMR Summer Symposium.

Licensing Specialist Murakami drafted new sections and subsections along with new language to the Hawaii Administrative Rules. This included creating a hearing process for individuals who are teaching without a license or a permit.

### Specialist Jennifer Padua, Ph.D.:

Licensing Specialist Jennifer Padua engaged in various activities from May to July 2025. At the national level, Specialist Padua attended the National Association of State Directors of Teacher Education and Certification (NASDTEC) Annual Conference in North Carolina. She attended conference sessions and met with members of the NASTDEC Western Regional and Professional Educator Standards Board Association. She discussed teacher education preparation programs and licensure requirements with staff from other state licensing agencies. Specialist Padua contributed to the completion of the Title II Report on licensure exams and program preparation requirements. She also attended the Association for Advancing Quality in Educator Preparation (AAQEP) national networking sessions. Currently, Specialist Padua is learning the accreditation process for the Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation.

In May 2025, Executive Director Villalobos and Specialist Padua collaborated with Mr. Jason Dietrich from Praxis Educational Testing Service (ETS). Their work involved meeting with Hawai'i Educator Preparation Programs (HI-EPP) with teacher licensure programs in Special Education (SPED). These HI-EPP will align its SPED licensure programs with the new Special Education Foundational Knowledge Praxis Exam and Council for Exceptional Children Standards. In addition, the HTSB and ETS teams met with staff from other HI-EPPs and the Institute for Native Pacific Education and Culture (INPEACE). Specialist Padua is communicating with ETS Praxis staff regarding revisions to the ETS Praxis website and aligning the Career and Technical Education (CTE) exams to the recently adopted thirteen CTE Pathways (read New Business Item 24-24).

At the state level, Specialist Padua engaged with different agencies. She discussed Hawaiian Permit requirements, licensure requirements, the Hawaiii Administrative Rules, Affiliation Agreements, the United States Department of Education's Strengthen Accountability for Colleges and Consumer

Protection for Students regulations, and the State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA) with employees from the Hawai'i Department of Education. She also delivered a licensing presentation at the Hawai'i State Teachers Association's Koʻolau Chapter Start of the School Year event and distributed information at Kapolei High School's Wellness Fair. Specialist Padua participated in the Teacher Education Coordinating Committee meeting and contributed to the development of its strategic plan.

Since May 2025, Specialist Padua supported the HI-EPPs in various ways. She continued discussing program review requirements and met with members of the program review committee. She met with UHM COE faculty from their Multilingual Language Learner, Special Education, and Hawaiian Immersion programs. Specialist Padua also met with faculty from the UHM Library and Information Science (UHM LIS) and Hawaiii Pacific University about the potential of adding or modifying licensure programs. She assisted EPP faculty with issues they had encountered with submitting program recommendations. She delivered licensing presentations to the following HI-EPP programs: iTeach, Kahuawaiola, Kahoiwai, and Teach For America. Specialist Padua communicated with teacher candidates about concerns regarding program completion requirements and issues with their HI-EPP. She continued work on the Federal Title II report.

Specialist Padua contributed a significant amount of time to the now bankrupt Teach Away program (read New Business Item 24-19). She assisted former Teach Away staff in submitting teacher candidate evidence of meeting licensure requirements and collecting evidence on the current status of Teach Away candidates who have not met licensure requirements. She communicated with AAQEP staff and the Title II office regarding Teach Away's bankruptcy. Specialist Padua collaborated with staff from Hawai'i Pacific University, Chaminade University, and the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa College of Education (UHM COE) to explore potential pathways for Teach Away candidates to obtain licensure. Specialist Padua also disseminated information and communicated with Teach Away candidates about obtaining a teacher license and meeting licensure requirements.

Executive Director Villalobos, Specialist Padua, and Licensing Clerk Coloma started the HI-EPPs annual and audit meetings. Thus far, the HTSB team has met with faculty and staff from Leeward Community College Career and Technical Education, University of Hawai'i at Hilo, UHM COE, and the UHM LIS. By mid-September 2025, the HTSB team will have met with all HI-EPPs.

In May 2025, Specialist Padua participated in HTSB's Hawaiian Workgroup meeting. The workgroup discussed the Hawaiian Permit and student teaching requirements, and professional development efforts (read New Business Item 23-22).

At the organization level, Specialist Padua was involved with HTSB's Summer Summit. She developed materials, planned sessions, organized the conference settings, and facilitated sessions with stakeholders. Specialist Padua continues to collaborate with HTSB staff to analyze data and synthesize information, ensuring that stakeholder input aligns with HTSB's strategic plan. She continued processing permit or licensure applications. Specialist Padua continued to communicate with Business Solutions Technology staff about improving efficiency, addressing problems, and finding solutions within the Licensing Management System.

## Specialist Mitzie Higa, EdD:

Licensing Specialist Higa continued to participate in meetings/trainings with the other Licensing Specialists to understand and learn teacher licensing requirements for every situation and worked with other specialists to understand licensing presentations to present to various groups, while also meeting and conferring about upcoming changes needed on HAR.

Licensing Specialist Higa also participated in presentations on licensing for various groups and planned for upcoming presentations as well as events to provide our teachers, and future teachers, and those who work with teachers and future teachers, information about licensing options and requirements. Specialist Higa also participated, and jointly ran, sessions at the HTSB Summer Summit, to collaborate and gather information and gain insight to help develop HTSB's new Strategic Plan.

Specialist Higa along with Executive Director Felicia Villalobos continued to share the goals of the Teacher Registered Apprenticeship Program to support and encourage other groups to support the program as it will allow teachers to become teachers through a State Approved Teacher Education Program for free, by using the federal SAEF grant money to pay their tuition, while they are hired as either EAs or TAs by Hawaii Public Schools (or they are already hired) through this apprenticeship to earn a salary and benefits, while helping to provide licensed teachers in Hawai'i with individuals from their own communities to help solve the teacher shortage crisis. Also, within the grant, cooperating teachers/journeymen who volunteer to take on apprentices in their classroom, with their administrators' permission, will be provided a \$4,000 stipend from HTSB, from this SAEF grant money, once the consult and confer process is completed. We are still waiting for consult and confer process on the Standards of Apprenticeship for Teachers to be finalized with HIDOE and HSTA. HTSB is still waiting to be able to start this Teacher Registered Apprenticeship Program using these federal funds, of 4.62 million, to help support ending this teacher shortage crisis. We met with DLIR to finalize the budget documents for the SAEF Grant, as we needed to revise them to the new timeline, as it took this long to get through this process. We prepared SAEF grant budget documents and sent to DLIR, who then sent them back to us, and we got them notarized with Board Chair Miyamae. Licensing Specialist Higa and Executive Director Felicia Villalobos, continued to meet with David Donaldson and the team with the National Center for Grow Your Own (NCGYO) to help prepare for next steps of the Teachers Registered Apprenticeship Program. We are all waiting for the consult and confer process to be complete, and we were also waiting for budget documents to be finalized, notarized, and now we are waiting for their release.

Licensing Specialist Higa continued to meet with UH Manoa staff, and others, to help HTSB support Educators Rising, as a continued pilot project, for Teaching as a Profession (TAP) teachers in our high schools. Specialist Higa, Executive Director Felicia Villalobos, and Specialist Idica had an inperson meeting for the CTE Workgroup on April 29th. They finalized their NBI to change from 6 CTE license areas to 13 CTE areas. This NBI passed our board. We are now working with our licensing specialists, ETS, BST, and LCC to make sure the 13 fields are now connected to paths of licensure.

## **Specialist Steven Harada:**

Over the past few months, Specialist Harada attended meetings and webinars with various organizations, including Business Solutions Technologies; Educational Testing Service (Praxis); the Association for Advancing Quality in Educator Preparation; the Office of Talent Management; the National Association of State Directors of Teacher Education and Certification – Western Region; the ProEthica Module Review team; the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa Library and Information Science program; and the now-defunct TeachAway/Klassroom. He also participated in meetings to prepare for the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board Summer Summit.

Specialist Harada continues to provide support with licensing presentations to our State Approved Teacher Education Programs and educational stakeholders upon request. This includes revising presentation materials to suit future sessions, tailored to the specific audience. These audiences are diverse and may include new hires, new student teachers, individuals converting from student teacher or emergency hire permits to a full license, and dual licensure candidates.

Specialist Harada recently participated in presentations for Teach For America, iTeach, Kahoiwai, J-1 New Hire Licensing, the Aiea-Moanalua-Radford Summer Symposium (in person), and the Kauai New Hire Orientation (in person).

Specialist Harada also supported preparations for the first-ever Hawaii Teacher Standards Board Summer Summit by conducting a site visit at the host location, Hawaii Pacific University's Aloha Tower Campus. He verified that on-site equipment such as projectors, laptop connections, and microphones—was functioning properly.

Specialist Harada continues to report bugs in our licensing management system to our technology vendor on an as-needed basis. This includes issues such as data import errors received through institutional recommendations.

### Specialist Kaulana Molina, NBCT:

Licensing Specialist Kaulana Molina has engaged in various activities from May to July 2025. At the national level, Specialist Molina has completed scoring National Board portfolio submissions. She has continued to participate in cross-state collaboration meetings with staff from the Association for Advancing Quality in Educator Preparation, the Praxis Educational Testing Service (ETS) data management system, and the National Association of State Directors of Teacher Education and Certification (NASDTEC) Western Regional meeting.


At the state level, Licensing Specialist Molina successfully carried out and completed several initiatives and projects. She coordinated the planning and implementation of the first annual Hawai'i Teacher Standards Board (HTSB) Summer Summit, collaborating closely with HTSB staff, stakeholders, and summit vendors. As National Board Certified Teachers, Licensing Specialist Molina and Tracey Idica facilitated a two-day, in-person workshop to onboard new teacher candidates pursuing initial National Board Certification. Additionally, in collaboration with Licensing Specialists Steven Harada, Mitzie Higa, Tracey Idica, Kris Murakami, Jennifer Padua, and Executive Director Felicia Villalobos, they delivered presentations to teacher candidates from Teach for America, the Hawai'i Department of Education J-1 teachers, and Kaho'iwai. Together with Licensing Specialist Padua and Executive Director Villalobos, they led two licensing breakout sessions at the Hawai'i

State Teachers Association's Windward Chapter. Lastly, breakout sessions on licensing were also provided for the Kaua'i New Hire Orientation, led by Licensing Specialists Harada, Higa, and Molina, as well as Executive Director Villalobos.


At the organizational level, Licensing Specialists Molina and Padua, together with Executive Director Villalobos, reconvened the Hawaiian workgroup. Alongside HTSB staff, Specialist Molina continues to participate in ProEthica instructional training modules. Additionally, all specialists are currently synthesizing stakeholder feedback gathered from the HTSB Summer Summit. In addition, she and Kelli Pang, Teacher Licensing Clerk, are working to update the current website with the design staff from Edlio and Business Solutions Technology. Lastly, Licensing Specialist Molina has been assigned an alpha and continues onboarding efforts regarding Professional Fitness matters with Licensing Specialist Murakami. Additional licensure and permit training is being completed.




# Q1 What method did you use to contact HTSB?
